40 YEARS AND COUNTING

I feel pretty sure that everyone here is familiar with the expression, "Ignorance is bliss." Back in 1975 and 1976 that expression pretty much describes where a group of parents were when we decided it was time for us to start a Christian school in Jackson. We were a small group of Christians who were very concerned about the culture. There seemed to be a steady increase in troubled children and teenagers who were wrestling with getting a quality education and growing their spirituality.

Several of us began meeting to brainstorm about how developing a Christian school could be done and how it could be funded. We purposefully committed to reaching out to every congregation for participation in providing our children and children to come with a college preparatory education in an atmosphere where they could continue to mature in their spiritual growth. We were committed to the position that academics would be stressed over athletics, without omitting athletics as part of a healthy lifestyle. It was also our determination that all teachers and faculty would be faithful Christians in order that our children would be exposed the influence of those Christian educators and caretakers.

While there were many obstacles to our goal, we were convinced that God would have His hand in our efforts to educate and nurture our children and children to come. Obviously, finances were a major obstacle. Those of us who were determined to accomplish what we'd been told would be impossible, dug in and began the process of reaching out to Christian parents and grandparents. We visited every congregation that would allow us to speak about our dream goal. There was a great deal of positive response. However, so many of our potential supporters would tell us, "I can't give you money now, but when you get the school up and running, we may be able to

help support the school." I don't know how to express to you how frustrating that was. We needed the financial support in order to get the school started, but apparently many people were not confident that in spite of our personal lack of financial strength, God would have His hand in our efforts.

As you can see, His influence has made our dream into a very powerful reality! There is no way this school would have come to be without God's stamp of approval. One of the goals of our committee was that we could assure our parents and families that Biblical teaching would be a powerful centerpiece of the educational opportunities Jackson Christian would offer all students. We were not trying to instruct the children in doctrine, only in God's word and His will for every child and parent involved in the school. That continues to be the philosophy even today.

It's very important that we not forget that the steering committee and the early board of directors were standing on the shoulders of several Christian educators who had gone down this road before us. They were willing to help us have a clear view of what we needed to do in order to create an educational opportunity for our children that would enhance their relationship with God. One of the most generous advisors was Jerry Escue, who later became a critical part of the everyday operation of Jackson Christian. He patiently met with us and advised us on how to maintain a positive direction in building what you see around you today.

Another outstanding Christian advisor was Floyd Daniel, a vice president from Harding University. He also spent time listening to our hopes and dreams and offered us invaluable advice on how to set goals and how to obtain what we needed to do to succeed in financing JCS. One piece of advice from Brother Daniel had to do with the actual fund-raising technique he had used in his efforts for Harding. With a smile and a twinkle in his eyes he said, "When you visit with someone to ask for financial help, always ask for at least twice as much as you think they will give. That way, they will be so grateful to give you half of what you ask that they will open up their billfolds and offer you assistance just to get you out the door."

Clark Cowart was our first board chairman. He was a very effective and capable leader and helped us grow into an effective board of directors. Some of you also know that Brother Walter Nelms was a valuable resource. As a Christian working in the world of education, he helped us in our compliance with educational requirement standards as directed by the State of Tennessee. We also owe a debt of deep gratitude to Christians like Paul Coffman, Kathryn Tyler, the W.H. Branch family, Warner Taylor, Murell Hasse, Leo Dickerson and his son, Barry Dickerson, Victor and Frances Sullivan, Mr. and Mrs. Harry Shelly, Gary and Sherilyn Martin, John and Alice Sawyer, and many more than we would be able to mention. (It would be mind blowing to think about how many barbeque chickens the Sawyers prepared for fund-raisers!) When I think about the Shelly/Martin families, I am aware they are in their fourth generation of supporting JCS. Because I'm fearful of accidentally failing to list all of our significant

supporters, I don't want to try and mention the names of every family and individual who made JCS possible. One of the characteristics of many of our donors was that they did not want or need public acknowledgment of the financial support they gave. In our history, we have many silent heroes who lifted up our cause and made Jackson Christian School a reality, not just a dream.

There was a time in our early history that each of the board members was required by the bank to make a personal commitment to "own" the very large debt that was part of starting the school. I have laughed and said that there were times I would wake up during the night and think, "Please God, don't let the bank call in the note – we don't have that much money!" I am aware that I was not the only one who had those same middle-of-thenight prayers.

In addition to our financial efforts, many of us invested a lot of what I call "sweatequity" in Jackson Christian. Many times our first headmaster, John Carey, and I took our old farm truck and went "shopping" for furniture and equipment to stock the school. Unfortunately, at the time we were starting Jackson Christian, there were several private schools that were failing. Those schools were in the position of having to sell off their furniture. We bought and loaded, and then unloaded desks, book cases, fixtures, supplies and many of the items we needed to furnish our classrooms. The women of the Jackson Christian family became a catering group to help with fundraising. Some of us cleaned the building and some of us served as substitute teachers. We also need to note the impressive leadership of Brother John Carey. He very carefully led us through the accreditation process. Even though we were a new and small school, under Mr. Carey's leadership we received accreditation from the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools – a very complex process. We should also note that we received that very significant milestone before any other private school in Jackson!

It is with such gratitude that we have to acknowledge the loving generosity of the elders of what was then the Central Congregation. They very graciously allowed us to begin our first academic year in the building of what is now Campbell Street. In order to accommodate the necessary requirements of the fire department, those elders allowed us to kick out walls, add fire doors and make many more renovations that were required for the safety and well-being of the first students whose parents entrusted their children to Jackson Christian School. If you think about the leap of faith those parents made when they loaned us their children, maybe you can grasp the enormity of their trust in our faculty and staff.

Remember that expression, "Ignorance is bliss?" Sometimes I think that if we had understood in the beginning all that starting a school would entail, we might have cowered in fear of the enormity of the task we had



set for ourselves. We have to recognize that only God made lackson Christian the reality that is today. It seems to me that those of our early teachers who gave up lucrative jobs in the public sector made serious sacrifices to be a part of a small, new school. Without those teachers, ICS would not have become the educational powerhouse it is today. We need to remember our debt to all those teachers and staff that took the leap of faith with us. I have to think of people like June Pipkin, Aneita Lentz, Linda Ruff, Julia Humphreys, Laura Jones, Pam Holmes and so many who took a chance on lackson Christian. Without their dedication to our purpose, we would have never succeeded in the way that we have.

While ignorance might be bliss, Jackson Christian stands today as a beacon of light and hope that our children and grandchildren have a stepping stone into their future as Christian leaders in our homes, in our communities and in the future of God's church.

lackson Christian hosted a ribbon-cutting ceremony Friday, Sept. 23, 2016, for its 12,000-square-foot addition to the middle and high school. Guests toured the \$2.4 million expansion, as well as renovated areas of the existing middle and high school. The event was held during the school's 40th anniversary year.

"Today marks the celebration of 40 years of sacrificial giving, dreaming and trusting our heavenly Father. There's no doubt that today we are reaping a harvest that we did not sow. It is my heart's desire that this remarkable addition to Jackson Christian will further equip us in this eternal process of shaping world leaders for Jesus Christ," Dr. Mark Benton, Jackson Christian president said. "I am

humbled by God's rich blessings and deeply encouraged by the outpouring of love by so many. May Jesus Christ always serve as the cornerstone for Jackson Christian and his immeasurable love the capstone."

The addition was created to enhance the overall academic experience. It includes the gateway to the building (lobby area), dedicated space for the choral program, a robotics lab and three new STREAM (science, technology, religion, engineering, arts and math) learning centers. Additionally, renovated space in the middle school created a new life sciences laboratory.

Significant athletic upgrades include a soccer complex completed in spring 2016, a tennis complex to be completed in spring 2017 and improvements to the football field, including new lights, goalposts and video scoreboard. All existing learning and common spaces were refurbished with new flooring and paint. Additionally, the cafeteria was remodeled,

adding a lounge area for senior and faculty/staff dining.

> In honoring the 40th anniversary, Judith Humphreys, a member of the inaugural board, and instructor Joan Gateley spoke. Humphreys' children and a grandchild are alumni of the school, and two other grandchildren are current students. Gateley has served the school for more than 30 years, continuing to teach mathematics.

The capital improvements are the result of the Lead Campaign, which launched October 2014 and stands at \$2.4 million in cash and pledges. Kathryn Tyler, who has been involved with the school since its inception, serves as honorary campaign chair. Ken (retired faculty member) and Linda (director of elementary) Bradford chair the faculty/staff portion, and Clark and Mamie Converse serve as parent chairs.

"We've been blessed by the enthusiastic support of the entire lackson Christian family," Chris Ramey, director of advancement, said. "Not only have they given their time and energy — but with virtually 100 percent commitment from the board, faculty and staff, they have contributed more than \$500,000 to this effort." With an overall goal of \$3.3 million, the Lead Campaign is set to conclude October 2017.







Forty-six high school seniors made up the 36th graduating class at Jackson Christian, who received their diplomas May 15, 2016.







Gifted Students Soar

Soar, lackson Christian's program for gifted students, challenges students to explore their abilities and work together to achieve a goal. In the first year of the program, students visited Jackson Escape Room, where they learned the importance of communication in problem-solving. While studying Tennessee history, students toured the state capital to see first-hand what they had been learning.

To prepare for their trip to Boston, the group studied the timeline of the Revolutionary War, looked at stops on the Freedom Trail, and completed a STEM challenge requiring them to design and build a device that would float a tea bag without it getting wet. Their materials were popsicle sticks, glue, waxed paper, masking tape, yarn and one tea bag.

High school students used their design and math skills to create games and a duck blind. They presented their scaled down projects to the Jackson Christian Board of Trustees. Students received an elective credit for the independent study project.

Soar is open to students in fourth-12th grade who meet the requirements for giftedness. Activities focus on personal power, creative thinking, critical thinking and perspective. Activities in 2016-17 are focusing on the life and work of Mark Twain. The semester will culminate with a trip to Hannibal, Missouri, to tour the cave that inspired "Tom Sawyer" and meet Mark Twain via a professional impersonator. Parent meetings to explore the social and emotional sides of giftedness have also been added to the program.

FROM THE CO TO SILICON VALLEY

Two Jackson Christian School students won awards and a trip to San Francisco as a result of their participation in the CO:de Catalyst Coding program sponsored by The CO in Jackson. Junior Maria McConkey finished in the top 10 and was named a Code Champion; senior Colton Graves was among the top 24 and was designated a Code Leader.

The competition included the top students selected from more than 500 students who represented 16 West Tennessee schools participating in the program. Competitors were required to design a five-page website and code it. They also participated in an online interview.

The all-expense-paid trip to San Francisco included visits to Google, LinkedIn, Apple and Pivotal Lab Software. At Pivotal Labs, students participated in a UX (User Experience) Design Workshop and learned about experiments and predictions, brainstorming techniques using stickers and Sharpies, and software development at Pivotal.

Donna Newberry, Maria and Colton's web design/coding teacher; accompanied them on this trip. Newberry stated, "This trip was incredible! The folks at The CO do things first class, and I am so happy to be in partnership with them. It was interesting to me that every company we visited encouraged the students to learn how to work well with

others. Collaboration is a word we heard over and over. We were also told to 'learn to face setbacks. Embrace it. Learn to keep going."

A Googler in the "People Department" gave students a private tour. The group learned that Google employees

do not get their own office or cubicle; instead, they sit close together to promote idea sharing and collaboration. Google looks for employees with humility, an idea that is reinforced by having new personnel wear a "Noogler" cap during their first week to remind them not to take themselves too seriously.

At LinkedIn, students learned that the company looks for learning potential and passion. They said they are interested in hiring problem solvers who love to learn. They urged students to demonstrate passion and create a positive online presence.

McConkey commented, "Even though touring Pivotal Labs, Google and LinkedIn was really cool, my favorite part was interacting with other students from different schools. As for the tech visits, I learned I should keep putting out work, even if it is not good. I should also keep trying to find ways to improve old work."

The group also toured China Town, Alcatraz, Golden Gate Bridge, Fisherman's Wharf, San Francisco Computer Museum and Ghiradelli's Chocolates. In addition, they rode a San Francisco trolley.

LIFE-CHANGING ZIMBABWE

lackson Christian students began taking mission trips during the 2009-10 school year. This was our first trip to Bulawayo, Zimbabwe. Fourteen seniors made the trip to experience a life-changing encounter with the people of Zimbabwe. Although the students started preparing for the trip in September, nothing could have prepared their hearts and minds for the palpable demonstration of God's love. Abby Mullins remarked, "Everywhere we went we would get smiles, nods, greetings, handshakes, hugs or all of the above. These people didn't know our stories, what we had done, what we had been through, or where we came from...but they didn't care. They knew that we were all brothers and sisters in Christ and that brought us together." It is amazing to experience how God's love transforms people. From the widows that we met who were eager to share whatever they had with us to the love of poverty-stricken orphans, God's love seemed to be ever present. Conley Clouse proclaimed, "How powerful it is to realize God deeply loves each one of us and is eager to use us in His kingdom work." Avery Roland commented, "Watching children who are hungry share their food with each other showed me what it truly means to love one another."

Not only did they encounter God's love, they experienced what it was like to fully depend upon Him in every situation. From encounters with complete strangers to experiences with inner city people, God's presence was evident. On our return flight from Zimbabwe to South Africa our plane experienced significant mechanical issues with the flaps. We went through the crash landing procedures in the event the plane ran off the runway or flipped after making impact. Clay Lewis shared his perspective on that event of the trip stating, "Many of us were fearful something was going to happen and we weren't going to make it home. We started our descent and the flight



attendants started yelling 'Brace, brace; bend over; put your heads down' over and over again. Many were crying and praying out loud. At that moment, I realized this was real. I was watching out the window as we were getting closer and closer to the ground. I began praying 'Father God surround this plane with your angels.' I repeated that prayer as fast as I could and as many times as I could. Right before we landed, I had this complete peace come over me, and I told the girls beside me that we were going to be all right. It was truly amazing to feel His presence during those few minutes.''

Words fail to adequately describe the experience. However, Amelia Grizzell was willing to share a portion of her journal – "There is a stirring deep within me. Could it be my time has come? The phrase, this written by Dr. Mark Benton

song that we have sung so many times since we arrived, stirs an emotion I can't describe. We've echoed it under a tin roof sitting on a dirt floor, we've taught it to the frail and to the pure. We've sung it underneath an untainted sky of stars and a full moon. My heart has experienced it – this stirring – when I embrace His people, when my skin draws chills when I hear these people praise our Father, when my chest feels an ache of warmth, when an angelic smile goes across a brown face. There is a stirring within, and my time has come. I can only pray that I may experience this stirring again as I share the love of Christ back home. Praise God. Bwana Asifiwe, for my time here." And perhaps that is the primary goal of such mission trips – to experience God in such a powerful way that we are motivated to share His love with all we encounter.

Matt Abernathy was inducted into the 31st Jackson-Madison County Hall of Fame, he was also recognized for his outstanding high school, college and professional baseball career. He was the first Jackson Christian graduate to be inducted, the first lackson Christian student to earn an athletic scholarship for college, first to play an SEC sport and the only graduate to play professionally.

Abernathy played baseball, football and basketball for the Eagles. He lettered in all three sports and was named All-State in baseball and football and All-District in basketball. During his five years playing high school baseball, Abernathy only struck out five times. His batting averages were .410 in eighth grade, .400s in ninth and 10th, .563 in 11th and .536 in 12th. During his senior season, he hit eight home runs and 48 RBIs in 24 ball games. On the football field, Abernathy led Jackson Christian to the first winning season his senior year (9-2) and won the Lions Sight Bowl. He was second in West Tennessee in rushing yards that season with close to 1,500 yards. On the basketball court, Abernathy helped lead the Eagles to a school record — He led the SEC in home runs per bat his junior year with 11. After his junior season, in wins with 23.

Upon graduation from Jackson Christian in 1991, Abernathy continued his baseball third in home runs and fourth in RBIs in the Single A Pioneer League that year. 
